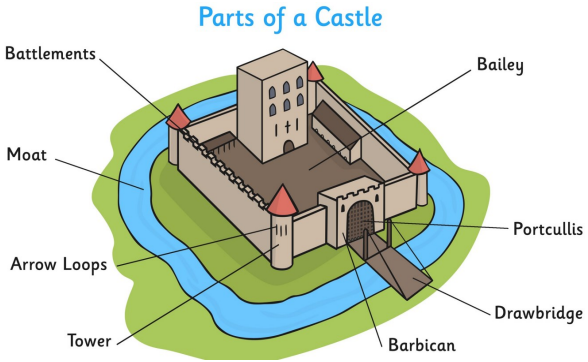
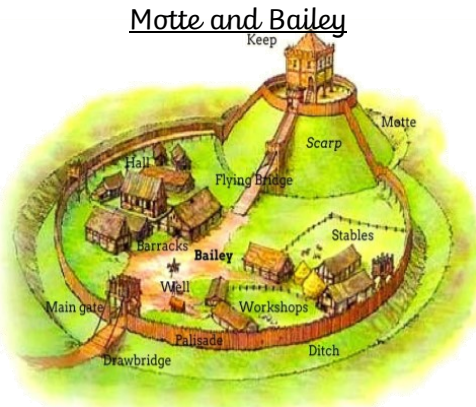

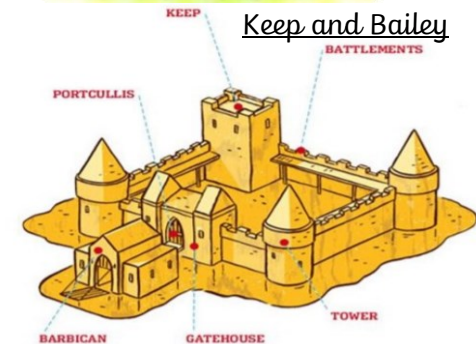

Vocabulary

bailey	The outer wall of a castle.
battlements	The top of the castle wall with raised sections and lowered sections.
castle	A large building, built with many things so that they are fortified against attack.
defence	Protecting or fighting against something.
drawbridge	A bridge that can be lowered or raised to enter or exit the castle.
enemy	Someone who hates or wants to harm another.
invade	Enter in large numbers with force.
keep	Fortified tower built within castles for defence.
King	Male ruler of a country.
Knight	Defended the castle and fought for their lord.
Lord and Lady	Important people who run and own castles. Lords are men and ladies are women.
moat	A deep ditch that surrounds a castle, often filled with water.
portcullis	A strong iron gate that can be raised.
palace	A large house that is the official home of someone very important.
Queen	Female ruler of a country.
riches	Things that make someone rich: money, gold, jewellery.
Steward	In charge of running the castle.
turrets	A small tower built on the castle.
